ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS NEEDED TO COMPLETE A CONCORDIA COLLEGE DEGREE

- Minimum 126 semester credits overall, excluding music ensembles
 - Of those 126 credits, a minimum of 40 credit hours must be at the 300 level or above
 - Two PEAK/Pivotal Experiences in Applied Knowledge for all students entering Fall 2017 and beyond
 - Institutional GPA of 2.0 or above, as well as a minimum GPA of 2.0 within major(s)/minor(s) – this includes concentrations where needed
